PALMER STADUM FAMILY

Palmer Stadum was born and reared on the family farm in Broe Township, and attended school at Baker where he graduated from high school in 1928. He started a Radio and Electric Repair business while still in high school. This he expanded after graduating, using the former bank building as his shop. After a few years of this, his interest in rural electrification inspired him to develop the first R.E.A. Project in North Dakota. During World War II he served in the Navy for 3½ years.

In 1941 he married Signe Solberg of Baker. They have three children:

Peggy is a graduate of Minot State College, presently teaching at Ely Elementary School in Rugby.



Beverly graduated from Augsburg College, Minneapolis, and obtained a Master Degree at University of Ohio.

Rodney is a graduate of St. Olaf, College, Northfield, Minnesota. He spent three years in the Air Force after finishing college. He is now employed as a Computer Technician with National Cash Register Co., at Cambridge, Ohio.

After many years with Baker Electric REA, Palmer and family moved to Minot where he has been employed by Main Electric Construction Company for 20 years.

In 1974 he was honored with the "State Electrician of the Year" Award. He plans to retire in the near future.

REA To Mark 50th Birthday

To mark the 50th anniversary of the rural electrification program next Saturday, a plaque, mounted on field stone, will be unveiled at 10:30 a.m. on the Orville Pierson farm three miles south of York.

Pierson's father, the late Ralph Pierson, was the first farmer in North Dakota to be served by the a North Dakota cooperative on Nov. 24, 1937, with power from Baker Electric Cooperative, then located at Baker, but since moved to Cando.

In a ceremony which is open to the public, the plaque will be unveiled by Sidney Olson of Mohall, president of the North Dakota Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives, and Ben Axtman of Rugby, president of Baker Electric.

From the Pierson farm the observance will move to a noon luncheon at Andrew's Steakhouse in Rugby, where special recognition will be paid to Palmer Stadium of Minot, formerly of Baker, incorporator, president and later manager until 1953 of Baker Electric, the first power cooperative in the state.

Stadium will receive awards from Baker Electric, Central Power Electric Cooperative Inc. of Minot, Minnkota Power Cooperative Inc. of Grand Forks and the North Dakota Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives at Mandan.

Lt. Gov. Ruth Meiers of Ross will be the speaker for the luncheon.

North Central Electric Cooperative at Bottineau will hold open house from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday in observance of the anniversary. Olson is president of the cooperative.

With 1.46 members per mile, the North Dakota Association serves 250,000 people with 67,000 miles of line.

"Of all the events we have planned, this is perhaps the most symbolic of what this celebration is really about," said Olson.

"The rural electrification program was founded in the mid-1930s amidst a great economic depression. Yet by working together these farms and ranchers were able to build a great electrical distribution system, despite the odds," he said.

Franklin D. Roosevelt handed down an executive order which on May 11, 1935, established the REA. When REA was founded, nearly

90 percent of rural America was without central station electric service. Due to financial backing by REA, 99 percent of rural America now has electricity.

Postmaster General Paul N. Carlin will officially issue a commemorative stamp in observance of the anniversary during ceremonies next Saturday at Madison, S.D. On May 13 the stamp will be available at the Minot Post Office.

Designed by Howard Koslow, artist from East Norwich, N.Y., who also created commemorative stamps for the Brooklyn Bridge and Tennessee Valley Authority, the stamp will eventually be used on about 160 million envelopes.

Gov. George Sinner has proclaimed the period from Sunday through May 12 as Rural Electrification Administration Week in North Dakota.

One of the more recent accomplishments of REA in North Dakota, in 1971, was bringing telephone service to the Squaw Gap area of western North Dakota by stringing 200 miles of line through rugged Badlands terrain to serve fewer than 100 ranch families.

Fred Ahlgren, who was manager at that time for Reservation Telephone Cooperative at Parshall, knew that REA loans came with the condition that the cooperative provide service to anyone in the co-op area that wanted it. Service was provided with 2 percent loan funds from REA.

Olson has remarked that it is ironic that on the eve of the anniversary

sary for REA rural electric and telephone co-ops are fighting for a program that's been their lifeblood for 50 years.

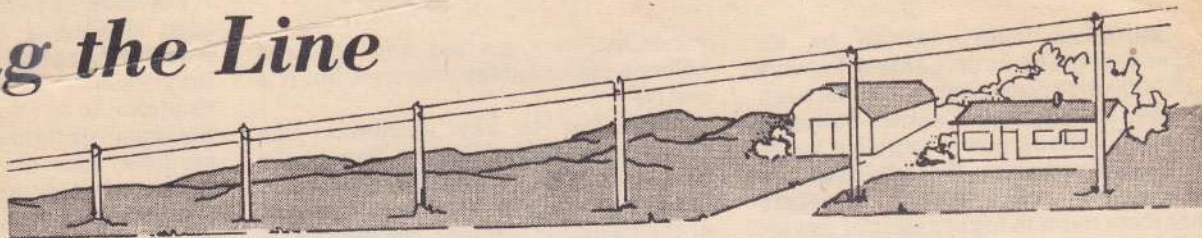
"Our theme this year is a 'Celebration of success; time for renewal,'" Olson said, "but it's turning out to be a fight for survival."

Reagan administration proposals call for raising the interest rate for REA loans to the government cost of borrowing plus 1 1/2 percent, effective Oct. 1, up from 5 percent interest from an off-budget revolving fund, and phasing out the agency over the next eight years.

Without REA funding, Leland Ulmer, executive vice president and general manager of the North Dakota association, says most cooperatives would have trouble finding loan funds.

He contends that the administration doesn't understand rural America and the special hardships faced by rural electric cooperatives, especially those in North Dakota.

PALMER STADUM HONORED

Palmer Stadum, original manager of the Cooperative, was honored at the Area Power Conference in Grand Forks on November 2, 1978 for his role in bringing central station electric service to rural North Dakota.

Andrew Freeman, general manager of Minnkota Power Cooperative, introduced Palmer to the largest luncheon gathering in the 25 year history of the Area Power Conference and related Palmer's role in organizing North Dakota's first rural electric cooperative and reminisced about their relationship in the early days of the REA program. Each person in attendance at the luncheon received a brochure entitled "The Palmer Stadum Story" based on information supplied by Mrs. Doris Stadig and the Minot Daily

News. David Hamil, retiring administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration was the featured speaker at the luncheon.

The annual Area Power Conference is sponsored by seven generation and transmission cooperatives, six investor-owned utilities, the Nebraska Public Power District and Manitoba Hydro.

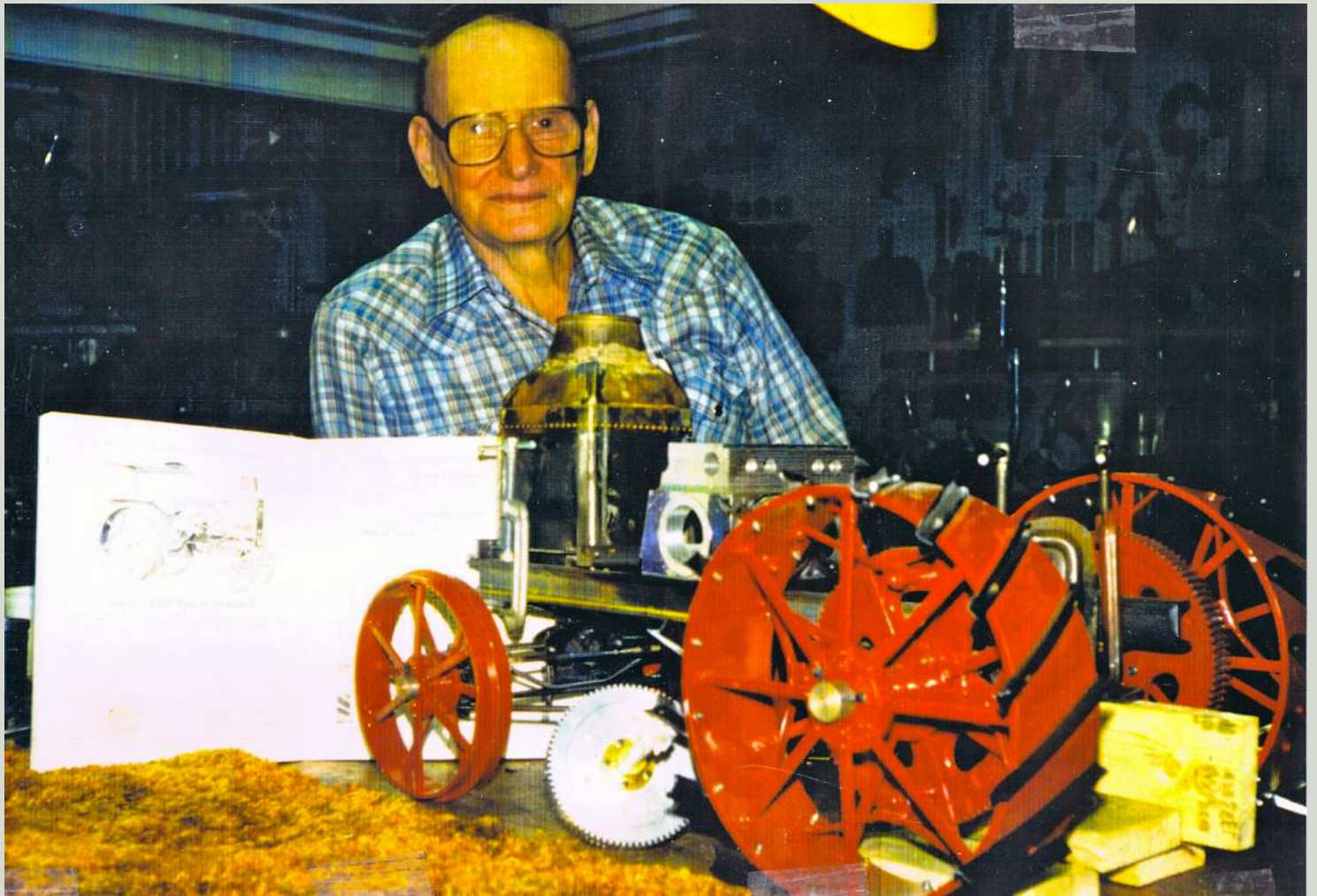
The November 3, 1978 edition of "Minnkota Messenger", a publication of Minnkota Power Cooperative, carried an article on Mr. Stadum and referred to him as "Mister Rural Electricity in North Dakota."

The October 1978 issue of "Ember", the monthly publication for the employees of Basin Electric Power Cooperative, featured an article on North Dakota's first rural electric

The funeral for Palmer Stadum, 89, of Minot was held at 2 p.m. on Jan. 23 at First Lutheran Church in Minot. Burial will be in the St. Petri Lutheran Cemetery, York, in the spring. He died Jan. 19, 1999 at Manorcare Health Services in Minot.

Rev. Lee Yarger, Rev. Darald Church & Rev. Ernest Stadum officiated. Gary Stenehem was organist & Josie Schmitt was pianist. Roberta Johnson provided vocal music. Pallbearers were Myron Hall, Jon Hillestad, Brad Perkins, Dave Smith, Mark Solberg & Gary Stadum. Honorary pallbearers were his miniature model maker friends. The Niewoehner Funeral Home of Rugby was in charge of arrangements.

Palmer Alvin Stadum was born April 22, 1909 in Benson County to John & Gina Stadum. He grew up in the Baker area & attended Baker High School, where he graduated in 1928. He ran his parents' farm & repaired radios until 1937. He organized & operated Baker Electric Cooperative in North Dakota. He married Signe Marie Solberg at York June 14, 1941. In 1942 he joined the US Navy & served with the Navy's Construction Battalion (Navy Seabees) in the rebuilding of Pearl Harbor. He was discharged in 1945 with the rank of Electrician's Mate First Class. He then returned to Baker Electric as manager. He worked at Main Electric in Minot from 1957-1974. During these years he set up a laboratory where he taught apprenticeship classes for the local Brotherhood of Electrical Workers of which he was also a member. During his retirement he built scale models of steam engines & other machines & traveled the state to show his work. His collection is on display at the Pioneer Village Museum at Rugby.

He was a member of First Lutheran Church in Minot.

Survivors include his wife of Minot; 2 daughters, Margaret G. Stadum of Rugby & Beverly Stadum of Minneapolis, Minn.; a son & daughter-in-law, Rodney & Chris Stadum of Dayton, Ohio; 3 grandchildren; a great-grandson; & a sister, Ida Hillestad of Mad-dock.

He was preceded in death by his parents & 2 brothers, Art & Julian.

For a short time she worked as a housekeeper for the superintendent of the San Haven Tuberculosis Sanitarium. She earned her Standard Teacher's Certificate from Valley City State Teachers College and began teaching at the Beaver (Pier-son) School, rural Benson County. She taught school in several other locations for many years. She married Palmer Alvin Stadum June 14, 1941 at York. While her husband was in the military service she lived in Rugby. They later moved to Can-do. In 1953 she began teaching school and continued until 1976. In 1958 they moved to Minot. He died Jan. 19, 1999. She moved to the Heart of America Medical Center Long Term Care Unit in 2001.

While living in Minot she was a member of First Lutheran Church, its ladies aid and its quilting group. She also volunteered at the Lutheran Home in Minot. She enjoyed baking, sewing, gardening and reading.
